# A Student Guide Booklet to the OCR (EMC) A Level Course

# Statement from the English department about the course

The OCR (EMC) English Language and Literature course is unique because it invites students to engage in both fiction and non-fiction texts. Unlike the literature course we offer, perhaps one of the key differences is that this course assesses students on their ability to produce fiction and non-fiction texts. Whilst students study 3 core literary texts (a play, a poetry collection and a novel) their study of these informs their own creative writing. It is therefore important to view this course as an integrated approach to the study of language and literature rather than 2 separate entities. We want our students to demonstrate:

- A good standard of written English. The course is all written examination/independent study (coursework).
- A willingness to participate in debate and discussion in order to prepare for critical and evaluative written responses.

- Regular wider reading of non-fiction and fiction texts. Students are expected to use their wider reading to enhance their written responses for the examinations and coursework.
- Ownership over their studies by completing homework and guided learning tasks on time.

### **Resources within the English Department**

Students working within the English department can expect the following during their study of the course:

- Dedicated subject specialists with experience of teaching this specific course.
- Library access with support from Mrs Hall when selecting wider reading material.
- Access to *emagazine,* an online secondary reading archive which offers support on essay writing, contextual information around your set texts and critical interpretations.
- Opportunities to enter creative writing competitions.
- Visit to the National Theatre Archives to view A Streetcar Named Desire.
- Language and Literature workshops at The British Library.
- Guest speakers from universities including *Goldsmiths College* and *The University of Westminster*.
- Access to ICT facilities throughout the course.

### About your course

# OCR (EMC) English Language and Literature

What do students study over the 2 years?

- 1 non-fiction anthology, comprising of both written and spoken texts.
- Carol Ann Duffy's poetry collection *Rapture*.
- Either Jane Eyre by Charlotte Bronte or Things Fall Apart by Chinua Achebe.
- Tennessee William's play *A Streetcar Named Desire*.
- Narrative writing.
- Non-fiction writing.
- A choice of 1 non-fiction set text and another text, either non-fiction or fiction for comparison.

#### Assessment:

The course is aimed at those looking to study for the full 2 years and complete the full A-Level course.

80% of the course is examined.

20% of the course is a non-examined unit called 'Independent Study' where students produce 2 pieces of typed written work.

The components hold the following weighting:

Component 1 (non-fiction anthology): 20%, 1 hour examination. Component 2 (Carol Ann Duffy's *Rapture* and Tennessee Williams' *A Streetcar Named Desire*: 30%, 2 hour examination. Component 3 (Reader as Writer, Writer as Reader), 30%, 2 hour examination. Component 4 (Independent Study), 20%, folder up to 2,500 words.

We recommend that students also use the PiXL6 Academic Writing booklet (available under our 'useful links' to support with essay and critical writing. Another useful text is *Style* by Joseph Williams, any edition is suitable.
